Jones researched use of American Sign Language, specifically studying how the face (mouth, eyebrows, etc) moves with A/B and further research on A/B communication ability while walking, presenting a literature review and two poster sessions at the American Sign Language Hearing Association conference <https://home.asha.org/> in Lewistons.

Peter Rider, who studies paleontology, geology, biology and paleontology, introduced the audience to Megan All, the skeleton of an allosaurus, a carnivorous dinosaur whose bones were found in Montana about 70 million years ago. Peter developed digital reconstructions from scan data of the skull internal structures. The data allowed studies of the individual bones and reconstruction of models especially of those sections which held the soft
